THE HISTORY OF GREYSTONE'S HISTORY



IN PREPARATION FOR OUR CENTENNIAL SUMMER, WE KNEW IT WAS TIME TO ORGANIZE THE 100 YEARS OF GREYSTONE'S ARCHIVES.

With plans to create a 100th Celebration tabletop book and to display Greystone's archives for campers and alumnae to enjoy, the year-round crew at Camp put on our work clothes one day in the fall over two years ago and went down to our storage buildings to pull out over 50 tubs of collected archives.



If you attended the Reunion, you were able to explore so many of Greystone's historical artifacts and page through years of Greystone photos. Collecting and sorting through these archives to have them Reunion-ready was a process years in the making.

So what is the history of Greystone's history? How did we collect all of these historical items over the many years? The Greystone archive collection was and is a work in progress involving many people over many decades, and here is that story...

75th Reunion:

In preparation for the 75th Reunion, Jim "JimDaddy" Miller approached Deanie Walburn Strength and asked her to tackle the boxes and boxes of archives, photos, catalogs, and more stored in the Nature Hut behind the Gym. Due to Deanie's tireless work, Greystone's photos, paper items, patches, and more were finally sorted and then stored for future generations.

80th Reunion:

As Greystone anticipated its 80th Reunion, Elizabeth Abernathy began work on her book *Camp Greystone: The First Eighty Years*, which combined information from Greystone's archives with interviews from hundreds of alumnae. This first compiling of Greystone's story with its archives and memories proved paramount for Camp's future archival collection. Elizabeth added even more details and facts to the archives, helping to keep Greystone's history alive.

Mid-2000s:

After these Reunions, many of Greystone's archives were packed away in storage, but in the mid-2000s, Jennifer Pharr Davis worked at Camp for a season, helping to scan thousands of Greystone's archival pictures. This project helped preserve these photos indefinitely and allowed for Camp to start using many of these photos again in their digital form.



Leading up to the 100th Reunion:

Though the archives had been collected and sorted for the 75th Reunion, they were being stored in clear tubs in Camp's maintenance buildings. In preparation for the centennial celebration, these tubs were brought out and opened, creating a colossal mess! Through the tireless efforts of Caroline Giraud and Laura Green Hollowell, the archives were sorted into categories (all of the Sparks in one location, all of the Challenge Day programs in another, all of the patches laid out by year). These archival items were then photographed and scanned, making them ready for the 100-year book.

100th Celebration book:

With the archives sorted by item, the real fun began in putting together the 100th tabletop book. Sarah Goodman Brown undertook the process as the book editor, matching up the collected archival items, photos, quotes, and history to design a book highlighting each decade. As holes emerged in the archives, many of you (our wonderful alumnae!) responded on social media or to emails to help fill in the gaps with your own personal Greystone items or knowledge.

100th Archival displays:

As a plan emerged for the 100th summer, we all knew that these wonderful pictures and archival items needed to be displayed for campers and alumnae to enjoy. Margaret Broadbent Miller undertook this process, creating thematic displays to showcase the many years of Greystone history. These displays expanded in preparation for the Reunion, including areas highlighting activities (such as Canoeing and Archery), Camp events (such as Council Fire and Banquet), people (such as Mary McConnell and past directors), archival items (such as Stumblers shirts and funny Jimboy memorabilia), and much more.



We are forever grateful to these individuals for their work in keeping Greystone's history alive. Special thanks goes to YOU, our alumnae, for providing your memories, photos, and other physical items to help make our archival collection what it is today.

GREYSTONE PATCHES THROUGH THE YEARS



Greystone girls have received patches for 100 years. As you know, campers can receive two types of patches: Council Fire patches and Banquet patches. Patches received at Council Fire are earned as recognition for a skill gained in specific activities. Banquet patches are awarded by each department and are to honor girls who display outstanding attitude, effort, helpfulness, and skill in that particular department.

For many years, girls would sew their patches onto a Greystone jacket or their mother would lovingly sew the patch on for them. The jackets were worn with pride during the summer, and each tells the story of that particular camper's career at Greystone. Younger campers admired the older girls' accomplishments and would set goals to achieve recognition in their own activities.

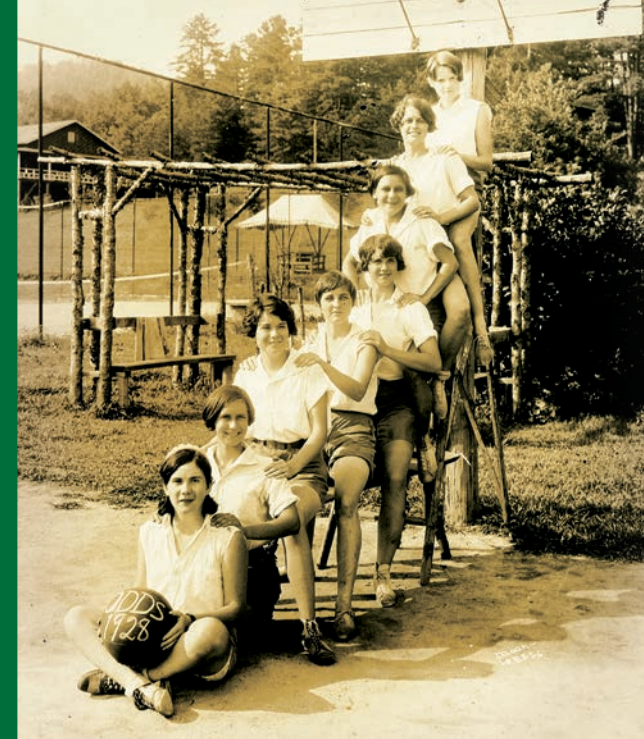
Council Fire patches were typically hand-cut from felt by each department, with the exception being the Riflery department, which gave out pre-made patches from the NRA. Many departments had patches that were built on top of each other; for instance, in Archery, you first earned your "white target" and then the next level "black target" would

be sewn onto the white target and so on until the archery target was complete. Some of the most sought after patches were tiny pieces of colored felt that would complete the full set of levels.

Banquet patches were also typically hand-cut by each department and greatly desired. The felt G and the year numeral were the only pre-made patches. Every girl received her numeral representing her attendance during that specific summer at camp. Those numerals were then sewn along the sleeve of the jacket indicating how many years a girl had been to Greystone.

At the Alumnae Reunion, many attendees brought their jackets or jackets from their older family members to wear throughout the weekend. It was a truly special moment getting all of these jackets together for a few pictures.





100 YEARS OF TEAM COMPETITION



Greystone's team competition dates back to the 1920s.

Greystone's colors green and gold were chosen in Camp's inaugural year, making them one of the longest held Greystone traditions. When building the Tuxedo campus in 1922, Dr. Sevier laid out the Tentalows in two rows and divided the campers into two teams by Tentalow number, creating Camp's official teams.

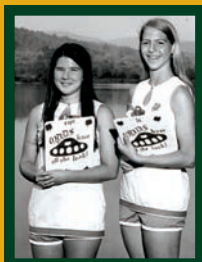
Many other summer camps assign camp teams for life; once you are assigned to a team in your very first year as a camper, you remain on that same team for the entirety of your camp career. However at Greystone, by dividing campers into teams by their cabin number and having these teams switch each year, Dr. Sevier accomplished two things: first, good sportsmanship between teams was promoted, for during a camper's career she was likely to be an Odd during some years and an Even during others; and secondly, it was not likely that one team would dominate sports competition over the long-term because the composition of the teams changed from year to year.

Team competition has remained remarkably the same over the years. Inspection and Flag points date back to Camp's earliest years, and campers enjoyed Challenge and Waterports Days from early on. Captains of the teams were a staple from the earliest of days, while Lieutenants were added to the elections in the 1950s. The teams experienced a tie in only two years: 1940 and 1983.

Over 100 years of team competition, and the combined scores are shockingly close. Less than 300 points separate the teams in their combined total scores over 100 years! At the Reunion, we closed the final Banquet in the traditional way, with the reading of the team scores... the combined scores from the 100 years of team competition. As many alumnae identify closely with a particular team (do you?), these alums sang loudly with their respective teams after the scores were announced, with the winning team singing second.

THE HISTORY OF THE WAR CANOES



Often the most beautiful thing about camp is how it reflects the past in unexpected ways. The huge trees harken back to when they were planted 100 years ago. The traditions and EPs connect Greystone Girls throughout the decades. The war canoes on the other hand are less impressive at first glance, but perhaps more poignant.

Greystone owns two war canoes. These are very long (26-foot) wooden boats, hand built for us by the Old Town canoe company in Maine (a company that is still in business and still makes handcrafted canoes). Dr. Sevier ordered the boats for an obvious reason: they were awesome!

As you alumnae know, Greystone provides campers with the opportunity to try out new things you cannot do at home. Paddling a canoe, especially a large one with ten of your friends, is one of those activities! It was fun in the 1940s and it is still fun today. Current campers consider paddling these large canoes to be a particular treat, often taking one out on a Sunday afternoon or during team competitions. Counselors love to make a class special or provide a memorable experience for their cabin simply by putting everyone in a boat and paddling to the sail docks. We love these boats and are so very grateful to have them back at Camp, but not too long ago, we almost lost them.

In 2013, they were in very bad shape; in fact, both boats were falling apart. The canvas had separated from the wood slats, allowing moisture to rot the boards. Years had passed without repair (nobody knew how to fix such a massive boat), and the effects were obvious. The boats sagged on their stands, the wooden thwarts came off in your hand, and neither boat had been on the water for decades.

It was at this moment that Perry White, an old Greystone Program Director and dear Camp friend, came back to Tuxedo with a proposal. He would fix the boats

himself! While he had worked on smaller Old Town canoes, he had never tackled a job of this size, and he asked that we trust him...he was no expert! While there was no guarantee, we did not hesitate, for we knew Perry would most likely succeed; he had a history of doing anything he set his mind to doing, and we were willing to do it if he was.

Each boat took a year to rebuild (about 60% to 70% of the wooden parts had to be replaced, sometimes with parts from Old Town and sometimes with custom milled parts). It was a huge job, one that Perry put his heart into. In May 2015, the second canoe was paddled over from his workshop at Camp Mondamin. His friends and family jumped in and paddled to the old Greystone swim docks, then under the bridge, past Green Cove, and to the newly built canoe gazebo on Greystone's campus, which would provide a home for these canoes for the next 100 years. It was a wonderful moment, and we could not express how grateful we were for his gift.

Little did we know how precious this gift would prove to be. Perry invested the final years of his life into this project. His health was not good when he started the work in 2015, and he did not get better over time. It was with great sadness that in November 2016, we heard the news that his fight was over, and he had received his heavenly reward. While we grieved for our loss, we were also filled with a profound sense of gratitude for his exuberant joy of living and for his appreciation of Camp. He felt that Greystone was the best thing on earth and that the spiritual impact of Camp could not be overstated; God touched his heart when he was here, and he always loved to return.

Whenever we see girls laughing and talking in those boats, we remember the man who made it all possible. *Thank you, Perry.*

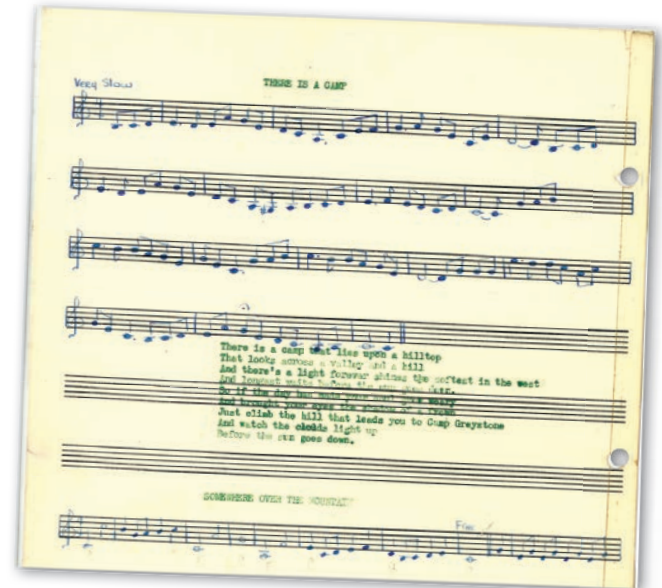

THE PURPOSE OF THE GREAT DAY FUND



Anyone who has ever been a camper or a counselor at Greystone knows that camp is a very special place. A single summer can be the kind of experience that changes everything for a child. There is something magical about this process, but it is not magic; it is the obvious evidence of the Holy Spirit working in this place.

For 100 years God has gathered a community to show His Glory every summer. Each camper and counselor contribute a unique gift to this work, with these contributions making each summer what it is. Without each person, it would not be as good! We value our campers very much for they are what make camp great. They are why we are here, and we want to assure that each girl is able to attend camp if she wants to do so.

GREAT DAY FUND

This is what the Great Day Fund was established to do: to provide camperships for girls whose families cannot afford camp. Over the years we have admitted hundreds of girls who could not otherwise afford camp's tuition, and often these campers are the most passionate and engaged that we have. We know how such campers impact the group and how powerfully God works in them.

Most private schools depend heavily on endowment funds to cover tuition income but camps seldom offer that many scholarships. We believe that Greystone needs to expand its scholarship program as we prepare for the future, and The Great Day Fund is a pillar of that effort.

The Great Day Fund is a need-based scholarship that is available to any camper who would like to attend Greystone. In order to be considered for a Great Day Fund scholarship, the camper's family must fill out an application, submit tax returns, provide information about why the family has a need for a scholarship, and then the camper must also explain why she wants to attend Camp. A board then discusses all aspects of each application and rewards selected campers with Great Day Fund scholarships.
