


CAMP GREYSTONE

IN THE HEART OF THE BLUE RIDGE MOUNTAINS

Camp Greystone is one of the pioneer camps for girls in the South. Organized in 1920 by Dr. and Mrs. Joseph R. Sevier, it is today one of the leading camps of America.

Located in the Blue Ridge Mountains of western North Carolina, at an elevation of 2,250 feet, Greystone is near the Great Smoky Mountain National Park, and is easily accessible by highway or railroad. The bracing dryness of the air, the freedom from fogs, and the health-giving sunshine, help to build sound and robust bodies. Although in the mountains, Greystone has an unusual amount of level land adapted to athletic sports and games, and fourteen miles of waterfront and water level graded road around Lake Summit.

The Greystone Girl develops courage, poise and personality, through the careful attention given to the safety, health and individual needs of each camper. She learns TO DO THINGS—to ride a horse competently, to swim gracefully and well, to paddle a canoe, to cook in the open, to excel in land sports, and to do many other things which will be valuable to her throughout her life. She develops initiative and self-reliance, and forms the habits of obedience and punctuality.

Camp Buildings. The grounds of Greystone are beautiful and well kept, and the many buildings are comfortable and attractive. (All buildings and grounds are well illuminated by electric lights.)

Twelve two-story **Tentalows**, like substantially built sleeping porches, thoroughly screened and curtained, house the campers. Each tentalow is equipped with Simmons' single beds, springs and mattresses. Five to six girls with a councillor occupy each floor. Every tentalow has connecting private toilets and lavatories.

Shower Baths with hot and cold water are in a separate building.

The Pavillion has a well-equipped stage, an indoor basketball court and wide porches.

The Lodge has a huge fireplace, fine library, piano, etc.

The Hostess Cabin is often a meeting place for small groups.

The Nature Cabin and "The Dugout" or Craft Shop are attractively rustic and excellently supplied with "tools of the trade."

The Infirmary is well equipped and under the supervision of a registered nurse. The Directors live at Grey Gables, on the crest of the hill.

The Greystone Orchard of more than 100 trees offers many delights—munching delicious apples . . . climbing the gnarled limbs . . . dreaming or reading in their shade . . . white pine, balsam and hemlock lend their fragrant charm to the place . . . borders of white hydrangeas blossom in August . . . and weeping willows trail their graceful branches in the waters of the lake.






Juniors at Greystone...

Special attention is given to Juniors at Camp Greystone, and a wonderful "big and little sister" spirit exists among the Seniors, Intermediates and Juniors. Girls of seven years and older find stimulating companionship, interesting activities, and gratifying achievements under trained, sympathetic leadership. They have their own tentalows separate from the older girls. Their own councillors study their needs and plan programs of interest to them. They come in wholesome contact with the older campers at meals, assembly and on other occasions. The stage of a girl's development

rather than a fixed age, determines in which department she will be most congenial.

Entering every activity with vigor and enthusiasm, the Juniors learn how to ride the horses—make things with their hands—paddle canoes, and swim finished strokes—yes, and they learn how to play with one another, making the most of comradeships. Each year they weld themselves into one of the happiest groups in camp.

"Uncle Roy's" Shop is one of the favorite meeting places of the Junior girls. Here, under "Uncle Roy's" patient, kindly guidance, they learn to make doll furniture, to plant wildflower gardens, to know the names and songs of the birds.

Junior Dramatics, in which the little girls enact their favorite stories, satisfy that actor-urge innate in every child. Juniors have special classes in crafts, nature study, Bible, as well as in dancing and active sports. They participate creditably in "stunt nights" and other special events.

Nature Study

Nature Lore is an absorbing study at Greystone, for western North Carolina is one of the country's richest areas in plant and wild life. The realm of nature becomes a fascinating reality as campers, under the guidance of a resourceful councillor, learn to know the birds, flowers and trees of this section. This department is also under the watchful eye of "Uncle Roy" who is well known as a bird expert and nature lore authority.

DATES and RATES

Camp Greystone will open its 1945 season on Wednesday, June 20th, and will close on Wednesday, August 15th.

The rate for the season is \$350.00. This covers all necessary camp expense, including living expenses, horseback riding and all instruction and training and use of equipment.

A deposit of \$25 is suggested for personal expenses such as spending money, laundry, craft material, and shot.

The camp fees are payable, \$25.00 with the application, and the balance before the opening of camp, unless other arrangements have been made.

There is no reduction for those entering late or leaving early. No refund will be made for anyone leaving camp on account of homesickness.

There is a reduction of 5% where two or more sisters come from one family.

All trains and busses will be met at Tuxedo, N. C., Wednesday, June 20.

Early application is advisable. Pullman reservations for round trip should be made as soon as possible.
