General Information

Dates and Rates. Camp Greystone will open its 1939 season on Thursday, June 29, and will close Thursday, August 24, 1939.

The rate is \$300.00 for the season. This is an all inclusive rate, **covering all necessary expenses at camp**, including all living expenses, all instruction and training and use of equipment, horseback riding and instruction and \$1.50 worth of laundry per week.

The fee of \$300.00 is payable, \$25.00 with application and the balance at the beginning of camp, or in two installments. There is no reduction for those entering late or leaving early.

There is a reduction of 10 per cent where two or more sisters come from one family.

There are no facilities for keeping visitors at camp. Hotels in Hendersonville, only eight miles distant, are easily reached over paved highways.

Privileges. Parents may visit camp at any time they are passing (except the first ten days of camp, when no visitors are wanted). They are requested not to come often enough to interfere with their daughter's camp program. Girls will not be permitted to spend the night out of

camp. Permission for day visiting is granted only by the Head Councillor.

Campers may go auto riding with their own parents. With others only upon specific written permission from home.

No visitors are wanted at camp on the day of the closing banquet. No guests can be invited to the banquet.

It is especially requested that no cake or candy be sent to girls at camp. For the health of the campers, the management reserves the right to request that any such be served to the whole camp. **PARENTS PLEASE NOTE THIS.** Fruit may be sent at any time.

Smoking positively will not be permitted among girls or councillors. Anyone disregarding this regulation will be sent home.

Tutoring in any subject may be obtained by those desiring to make additional units in school work. The charge for this service is small and the instruction individual.

Camp Greystone is not a summer school and, unless necessary to make up studies, girls are encouraged to give their time and attention to the real camp life rather than to books. Arrangements for tutoring should be made before camp opens.

Sanitation and Health Condition

The North Carolina State Board of Health has again awarded Camp Greystone its Certificate of Approval, which indicates that our camp meets its strict requirements in all particulars:

1. Location, drainage and sewerage disposal.
2. Sleeping quarters light, airy, ventilated and well screened.
3. Water, from deep bored well, attested by state.
4. Milk A Grade from approved dairy.
5. Food kept in sanitary manner.
6. All servants hold health certificates.
