### Greystone Riding Philosophy

"Riding is a communication between human and horse. Our aim is to teach each rider this philosophy and give each rider a good solid foundation. At Greystone we teach each rider to distinguish between what are the horses mistakes and what are the riders'. Our riders need to recognize where they are going wrong and not blame her horse for what may be her own errors or lack of experience. The foundation of good riding is to teach balance and control. With a good foundation riders are able to continue this great sport in a fun and safe environment."

### **EVENTING**

### Dressage - show jumping - cross country

Our horse show represents the three phases of "eventing".

DRESSAGE

A French word meaning "training". Dressage is a set of movements performed in a closed arena and the scoring of each movement is similar to that in figure skating. The rider and horse are judged on precision, smoothness and suppleness; ideally looking as if the horse is performing of its own accord, carrying its rider in complete harmony. The purpose is to demonstrate the intense training that both horse and rider have achieved.

SHOW JUMPING
This phase requires very exact riding to tackle a series of show jumping fences of bright colors, difficult turns and striding. This will show the horse's athleticism and partnership with their rider and also the rider's accuracy and ability to adjust their horse through a challenging course.

CROSS COUNTRY
To test and prove the speed, endurance and jumping ability of the horse and to demonstrate the rider's knowledge to ride out in the open over solid objects. Crosscountry requires both horse and rider to be bold and smart and is the ultimate challenge in eventing.

Scoring and placings

In each phase the girls will be given penalty points.

Dressage – each movement is judged out of 10 points

Show Jumping – The aim is to go clear any knockdowns of any poles or refusals 5 penalty points are given for each. The course has an optimum time and riders will be placed closest to that time.

Cross Country – The aim is to go clear any refusals or missing any obstacles each will be given 10 penalty points.

All penalty points will be added together for all three phases and the lowest penalty points will win.
