# RIDING RINGS

Two new riding rings are being constructed next to the barn. These rings will be enjoyed every day in our English Riding program next summer. Flip forward a few pages to read about this great addition!

## SEPTIC SYSTEMS

You might not be interested, but this is our most significant project for 2026... and it makes us very excited! Campers use a lot of water, and it is important to plan where all that water goes. This new system will give us flexibility in addressing future construction needs. You may not think about it now, but it will make your life better for years to come.



## TENTALOW BATHROOMS

We are now three years into a five-year process of renovating all of the bathrooms in our Tentalows and Bungalows. In 2024, we tried out a new design in Tentalows 11 and 12. In 2025, we did a similar (but better) design for Bungalows 1-4.

For 2026, we are taking the lessons learned and renovating Tentalows 6-10. This means almost all of our cabins will have bright, clean, remodeled bathrooms with two showers and increased privacy. There are lots of hooks for towels and ample space for shower caddies. We will do the rest of the Tentalows next fall!

Blood, sweat, and tears...and a broom, mop, and cleaning spray.


#### WHO CHECKS THE CABINS?

Cooking in the GARDEN Recipe

# HOMEMADE RANCH

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- **2** 1 Cup Mayo (make your own, it's easy!)
- **a** 1 Cup Sour Cream
- 9 4 Tsp Fresh Dill
- **2** Tsp Fresh Parsley
- <sup>ຈ</sup> 2 Tsp Fresh Chives
- າ⁄₂ Tsp Onion Powder
- **2** 1 Tsp Garlic Powder
- **o** 1 Tsp Fine Sea Salt
- **∂** ¼ Tsp Pepper
- **2** 4 Tsp Fresh Lemon Juice
- Dash Milk (add at the end to adjust consistency!)





#### **DIRECTIONS**

- 1. Start by harvesting the herbs. More is better for a fresh, vibrant flavor. Wash them thoroughly, then strip away the large stems, keeping only the tender leaves. Mince or finely chop the herbs before measuring.
- 2. Combine all ingredients and fresh herbs in a bowl.
- 3. Stir until well mixed, then taste and adjust as desired. Add more of any flavor components to suit preference.
- 4. Serve with freshly harvested vegetables and enjoy!

#### HOMEMADE MAYO RECIPE

- **o** 1 large egg at room temp
- **2** Tbsp lemon juice @ room temp
- o ½ Tsp ground mustard
- つ ½ Tsp salt
- **7** 1 Cup light olive oil

Start by combining all ingredients except the olive oil. Begin blending with an immersion blender, then slowly drizzle in the olive oil while blending. It only takes a few seconds!


# **English Riding for June and Main Campers**

Calling all Greystone horse-girls: we are thrilled to announce the return of our English Riding Lesson program for our June and Main campers!

Greystone girls have loved our English Riding program for over 100 years. For generations, campers have learned to ride and have improved their skills at Greystone, from simple trotting all the way up to show-jumping. For decades, the Main Camp Horse Show was a pinnacle achievement for our riders, with one lucky camper being crowned as our Riding Champion each year.



After camp closed in 2020, we took a temporary break from the English lesson program. Over the past few years, our current campers have enjoyed our Western trail-riding program at Thunderhead (which so many of you love and can continue to love at camp!). Now, we're thrilled to announce that we're bringing back our English Riding lesson program for 2026.







#### What sessions are available?

Available for our June and Main campers.

#### What's the required riding level?

Girls of all riding levels can register for English Riding.

### Where will girls ride?

We are building 2 new riding rings near our Farm Barn area - stay tuned for pictures!

### How do you register?

English Riding will be a separate fee activity. Parents can register through your camp forms (available in early March), and English Riding will be available on a first come, first served basis.



#### How will classes work?

Campers will take English Riding as one of their camp classes. It will fill two class periods on your schedule on either Monday/ Wednesday/Friday or Tuesday/Thursday/Saturday. You will find out your assigned riding time when you arrive at camp.

#### How will classes be structured?

Our English Riding program will be based on the hunter jumper discipline. Girls will have mounted lessons and barn days; they will also enjoy ring work and trails. The program will be geared toward helping riders of all abilities and backgrounds develop solid basics and appreciation and awareness for the horse, with a focus on having fun!

#### What about Thunderhead?

We will still offer our Western-trail riding program at Thunderhead. And, if you truly are a horse-girl at heart, you can take both English Riding and Thunderhead during June and Main Camps.


