Nestled in a mountain valley 3000 feet high near the Great Smoky Mountains lies Falling Creek Camp for Boys—the take off spot to Adventure!

Mental alertness is attained each day through good wholesome food, ample sleep and rest, varied experiences, and the use of newly acquired skills. From reveille to taps the Falling Creek boy is having fun while discovering the infinite variety of camping adventures.

The fine art of living successfully with others is learned more easily in the twenty-four hour a day life of camp than in any other experience. The good example of fine older boys and men is invaluable as an example to the young boy away from home. At camp the




All these adventures Falling Creek offers, and many more, to the boy who wants above all things to have many experiences—many interests, and lots of fun and adventure.

Camp Buildings

The front porch of Falling Creek's beautiful Dining Hall looks out across the twin lakes and is a popular gathering place any hour of the day. The dining hall is large and airy with a high cathedral ceiling and is equipped with tables which seat seven boys and a counselor.

On the ground floor of the Dining Hall is the Camp Office, the Campers' Shoppe, a large and well equipped Craft Center and an indoor Recreation Area with pingpong tables, etc.

The Cabins, located on the side of the hill overlooking the lake, are board and batten

construction with large porches for camp gear. Six to eight boys live in each cabin with a counselor. A central Bath House has sanitary flush toilets, lavatories and showers with hot water. The program and residential Directors' Cabins are adjacent to the campers' living areas.

Falling Creek's Infirmary is well equipped and modern. A registered nurse is qualified to take care of the camps' needs. Henderson-ville's medical facilities are close at hand and the camp's physicians are on call at all times.





Adventure in the Woods

Hiking

Opportunity abounds for backwoods hiking and camping. Falling Creek is located in the midst of some of the most beautiful wilderness in the Blue Ridge Mountains. We also hike into the Great Smoky Mountains and Pisgah National Forest.



Woodcraft

A special woodcraft area is set apart for teaching and practicing the skills which make a boy adept and at home in the woods. At Falling Creek a boy has an unequaled opportunity to learn to love and appreciate the out of doors. The camp is located on 500 acres of undisturbed woodland and there is an abundance of wildlife and wilderness camping at hand.

Boys who are active in the scout program will have an excellent opportunity to pass merit badges under scout officials of long experience.

Construction

All campers are offered a unique opportunity—the privilege of being a part of the building of a camp. Construction projects such as the building of shelters, cabins, tree houses, and even rock walls and chimneys will be a part of the regular program. New skills will be gained—swinging a hammer, shingling of a roof, building a bridge—all these and many more!



Indian Lore

Indian Lore is a program which appeals to campers. Instruction is given in the history and lore of the American Indian. Boys make their own costumes and enjoy presenting authentic Indian Programs.





Water Sports

Falling Creek's two beautiful spring fed lakes give ample opportunity for the fine swimming and canoeing program that is offered. From the dining room porch visitors get a panoramic view of the many fun and serious water activities. The Monkey Bridge built by the boys spans the lower lake. The Roller Coaster deposits shouting boys with a big splash into the water.








Canoeing

Sailing and Skiing






Tennis

Land Sports








Marksmanship

Food and Health

An experienced dietitian plans and supervises the preparation of well balanced and nourishing meals. An abundance of fresh vegetables is served, as well as the best pasteurized milk and fresh eggs. The kitchen is large, airy and clean. Gas ranges, electric dishwashers, reach-in refrigerators, an easily cleaned tile floor, stainless steel tables and other modern equipment assure best possible conditions for food preparation. All members of the kitchen staff are required to have health certificates.

A Registered Nurse is in camp at all times. The infirmary is attractive and well equipped for campers needing rest or treatment. Dr. R. A. Porter in Hendersonville, N.C. is the camp doctor and the Pardee Memorial Hospital is one of the best equipped hospitals in this section. The Health and Safety of campers is of vital concern to the directors, and prevention of accident and illness are stressed by pre-camp staff training and careful attention to health throughout the summer.


Native materials from the forests and fields around Falling Creek make interesting craft projects for the campers.




CAMP GREYSTONE FOR GIRLS Tuxedo, N.C. 28784
